## Dear Attorney General Garland:

We write to ask you to prioritize vigorous enforcement of constitutional policing at the Department of Justice (DOJ) and resume the use of consent decrees where necessary. We welcome the statements you made during your confirmation hearing, as well as your commitment to holding law enforcement accountable for constitutional violations. In that effort, we direct you to report language included in the explanatory statement accompanying the *Consolidated Appropriations Act*, 2021 (P.L. 116-260). This language, included in the previous fiscal year as well, directs the DOJ to enforce constitutional policing statutes.

The Trump Administration's decision to reduce sharply the use of consent decrees hindered efforts to hold law enforcement accountable for constitutional violations. In a memorandum, then-Attorney General Jeff Sessions stated: "It is not the responsibility of the federal government to manage non-federal law enforcement agencies." This statement was mischaracterization of the DOJ's duties, as Congress has given the department the authority to investigate systemic violations of constitutional rights of all law enforcement agencies.<sup>4</sup>

Over the past four years, many criminal justice experts, law enforcement officials, and police reform advocates raised concerns about the impact of the Trump Administration's policy on police accountability and broader reform efforts. It is therefore imperative that the DOJ reverse course and use all available tools, including consent decrees, to ensure that constitutional policing standards are being upheld.

To that end, the Congress directed the DOJ to enforce constitutional policing with the following report language:

Constitutional Policing.—The Committee directs the Department to enforce constitutional policing statutes, including 34 U.S.C 12601, which may require the use of consent decrees as necessary, where constitutional policing standards are not being upheld.
